- Opportunities to grow in knowledge and understanding of the Gospel message through systematic catechesis. (Head)
- Opportunities to spark a passionate, heartfelt relationship with Jesus Christ through retreats, attendance at weekly Mass, and Scripture. (Heart)
- Opportunities to outwardly express faith through concrete actions in service to the community, and in exercising the Christian apostolate. (Hands)

Candidates




- Preparation for Confirmation in the Diocese of Rochester is a two-year catechetical process (proximate preparation) that begins in the eighth grade.
- Catholic School students should be referred to their proper parish.
- Candidates who have special needs should have catechesis (teaching of the faith) appropriate to their capacity, and then celebrate Confirmation with the support of their family and faith community.
- Prior to the actual selection of a sponsor in year two, both candidates and parents will be instructed on the role and responsibility of a sponsor.
- Near the end of the two year process there will be opportunities for an interview between the candidate and pastoral leader to reflect on the candidates' self-understanding of their faith, their desire to seek Confirmation, and their commitment to a life-long journey of discipleship; and sessions for immediate preparation for the sacrament.

Parents/Guardians of Candidates

- "The single most important influence on the religious and spiritual lives of adolescents is their parents." (*Soul Searching*, Christian Smith)
- Parents and guardians are invited to grow in their faith along with the candidates, and attend any sessions of interest.
- Two sessions in particular will be offered for parents and guardians on the meaning and theology of the Sacrament of Confirmation.
- Parents, guardians and candidates will together learn about the role and responsibility of a sponsor.
- Families are encouraged to join the candidates each weekend at Holy Mass, participate in opportunities for service in the community, and spend time together in prayer and reflection.

*Sponsors of Candidates

Pre-requisites:

- Must be at least 16 years old.
- Be a fully initiated Catholic: having received Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist
- Must lead a life of faith that is in accord with their commitment as a sponsor.
- Is not the father or mother of the one to be confirmed.

*It is desirable that the sponsor (godparent) at Baptism be chosen as sponsor for Confirmation, if he/she still meets the pre-requisites.
